The Navy Environmental Health Center Award for Command Excellence in Health Promotion, established in 1995, recognizes commands for their excellence in Navy Health Promotion and Marine Corps Semper Fit Programs. Non-competitive Awards for Command Excellence in Health Promotion are presented on three levels, Gold, Silver and Bronze. Commands submit an award package that reflects the level of

development of their command's Health Promotion Program. All commands with Navy Health Promotion or Marine Corps Semper Fit Programs are eligible for this award.

WEIGHT MANAGEMENT TRAINING FOR BUMED-APPROVED PROGRAM

Effective 1 October, responsibility for the Navy's Weight Management Program was shifted from BUMED 03 to BUMED 02/NEHC. Health Promotion staff at the MTFs will coordinate the local level program. The first Weight Management Training for staff at the MTFs will be held 12-13 Dec 00 from 0830-1500 at the Fleet Training Center, Norfolk, VA. The new program, ShipShape, focuses on a team approach to weight management. We would like to have teams of professionals with nutrition, exercise and/or behavioral backgrounds from at least 12 MTF sites attend the initial training. We have approximately 20 seats available in the classroom OR you may virtually connect via Video Tele-Training (VTT). BUMED NOTE

6150 - DD 2766 Guidance - signed 1 Sep 00

"Guidance for Completing Adult Preventive and Chronic Care Flowsheet (DD 2766)" is now official. It states in the first paragraph that **"the DD 2766 functions as the summary health form documenting Navy Medicine's proactive delivery of preventive care within our facilities"**. This is a positive statement and the language is clear that **it replaces the NAVMED 6150/20 for adult patients**. It reminds us that the **DD 2766 is a tool** and that all levels of providers should document on it, not just "privileged" providers. The note says that **documentation on the DD 2766 should be done as a face to face encounter** to incorporate both history from the medical record and information from the patient. **It discourages "transcribing" records just to fill out the DD 2766** by acknowledging that it is not solely a record review. It says: **completing DD 2766 is part of a process and a reasonable component of**

a preventive visit or an initial intake into the MTF. It takes you step by step through each section of the form and references that it supercedes the Manual of the Medical Department. Some sections are not used at this time, so that should help ease the burden of a new standard form. The current and correct stock numbers are listed in the last paragraph for the DD 2766 and DD 2766C (continuation sheet). **It also states that the NAVMED 6150/20 is still available (for use with pediatric patients)** (That is, until the child/adolescent version of a prevention and chronic care flowsheet is approved through the Health Affairs chain, [a process currently](#) in the works). You should have seen this note before in its draft form, but **please read it in its entirety and have it available for reference**.
